The English Oak, *Quercus robur*, is a large, deciduous shade tree good for lawns with ample space. This oak produces acorns in its first year and has heavy crop every two to four years that may present a litter problem. In autumn, its leaves turn brown, although it is not uncommon for them to remain green into winter.

The English Oak adapts well to tough growing conditions. It tolerates drought, pollution, restricted root space and a wide range of soil pH levels. It prefers moist, well-drained soils but adapts well to moderately poor or dry areas. The English Oak grows best in full sun but is shade tolerant in youth.
