

NANNYBERRY VIBURNUM

The Nannyberry Viburnum, *Viburnum lentago*, is also commonly known as Sheepberry or Blackhaw Viburnum. This shrub or small tree produces fruit that ripen in late September or early October and attract many birds. In autumn it usually turns red-orange, but is not dependable for producing fall color. The Nannyberry Viburnum's showy white flowers bloom in late spring.

This tree is adaptable to many exposures and sites, including full sun or shade and moist or dry soils. It establishes and transplants easily. The Nannyberry Viburnum is good for planting on difficult sites, as borders or hedges, and to attract wildlife.
